Indu Haríkríshna, NSW

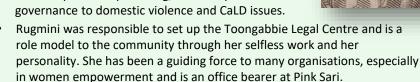

She had to constantly keep in touch, research into each girl and think of ways to assist them the boundless mental and physical capacity it needed.

Category: Performer

Kanan Shah, NSW

 Runs the dance school NIPA, Nartan Institute of Performing Arts for over 8 years, training more than 700 students of all ages and abilities. Completed more than 500 performances in Sydney since its inception, with 141 performances across community events just in 2019.



- Kanan's amazing work ethic, her infectious energy inspires her students and the people around her. She has supported numerous community events and contributed to the various programs through her patience and perseverance.

A specialist Endocrinologist, who recently completed a PhD in Andrology, with several notable research papers to her name. Nandini is one of the very few woman clinicians in Andrology (male reproductive health), having to move continents chasing the dream.



 Dr. Nandini's major work has been on the effects of non-prescribed testosterone use in body builders on male reproductive and cardiac functions. She is currently working to establish a genetic hypogonadism register in Australia, a first of its kind, through research grant (Ferring Award, ESA)

Anna Sokolova, NSW

 A distinguished scientist and physicist working at the Australian Nuclear Science and Technology Organisation. Anna's expertise is wide, ranging from the designing scientific instrumentation, to conducting complex experiments with global teams on the machine Bilby. She has authored 30 scientific publications, chaired the scientific & technical advisory panel since 2020



 As a member of the AINSE Materials Science and Engineering Committee, Anna assess applicants to reward students their PhDs. As a part of ANSTO's Women in STEM program, works with schoolgirls to showcase Science.
 When an opportunity comes, Anna believes it is rudimentary to perform at your best and inspire people around you.

- Dr. Garima is the first overseas trained woman Dentist
 of Indian origin to successfully complete her Doctor of
 Clinical Dentistry as an Endodontist.

- Dr. Garima Sharma is a passionate clinician, who enjoys her Dentistry and is committed to on-going learning, spreading knowledge and experiences.
